CALL TO ORDER: 7:30 P.M.

President Corcoran: I call to order the North Ridgeville City Council Meeting, Monday, October 4. Please rise for the invocation and the Pledge of Allegiance.

LOBBY:

President Corcoran: We have now come to the lobby session of the meeting. This is your opportunity to talk to us. If you have something to say, please come up to the podium; state your name and address and you have three minutes to bring your issues before Council.

1) Richard Monaco, owner of Hatchery Antique Mall located at 7474 Avon Belden Road, stated that he has been in business in this town since 1981. He spoke on the proposed ordinance referring to chickens and believes that Council has spent way too much time on this issue and that they have bigger fish to fry than to worry about his chickens and paying such close attention to what he is doing. He asked that Council stop dealing with this petty stuff and do something to make this a better town.

President Corcoran: Is there anybody else that would like to address Council this evening? Seeing none, we'll move on to Administrator's reports, Mr. Mayor.

ADMINISTRATORS REPORTS:

A. Mayor:

Mayor Gillock: Thank you, Mr. President. After two weeks of being here in the dark, now I feel like I am on stage with the bright lights. I have three things that I wanted to briefly mention this evening. First, we get letters quite often complimenting our Police, our Fire Department, and our Service Garage. I got one today that is very short and kind of reminds us of who these guys are and the jobs they do. I won't mention a name, but very briefly, "Dear Mayor Gillock, I have been a resident of North Ridgeville since July 1998. Since November of 2000 when my husband suffered a stroke, I've had to call upon the North Ridgeville EMS numerous times. The latest was yesterday, September 30. I am a 24/7 caregiver and my husband often loses control of his legs during a transfer and slips to the floor. He is not injured, but since he weighs almost 200 pounds, I am unable to lift him on my own. I call the squad and they are prompt, considerate and courteous. This group is such a valuable asset to our community and I want to take this chance to let you know what a wonderful job they are doing. It is reassuring to know that I can call them. They often tell me that this service is my tax dollars at work. This is money well spent. Thank you for such a worthwhile service." It is not unusual, but we need to remind ourselves every once in a while of where our tax dollars go.

The second item I wanted to mention is that you will be contacted by my Administrative Assistant, Sandy Hall, to set up a meeting regarding a potential project with Quasar. We have mentioned it to you before, I believe, and we are to the point where we are ready to proceed. This is a project to install an anaerobic digester at French Creek to help us process and get rid of our sludge and we need to explain that process to you along with the details of the contract and the financial ins and outs. So, we will be either looking for a Committee of the Whole or it could be a Utility Committee meeting, as long as you all attend, as it will be informational. We will have someone from an Engineering firm to help answer questions. It is quite an interesting project that we would like to proceed with as soon as we can. As I said, that will help us get rid of our sludge at French Creek. Right now, we are putting it on farmer's fields, which is difficult enough the way it is, but I spoke to the EPA today and in fact, they are soon to be passing

regulations that you will not be able to put it on fields during the winter at all. So, it is going to become that much more difficult. It is something we need to address.

Lastly, I put on your desk this evening, an ordinance amending ordinance 4742-2010 which has to do with the traffic signal at the intersection of Lorain Road and the eastbound I-480 ramps. We have completed the preliminary engineering for this project. We have been to ODOT who has agreed that if we do the engineering, they are going to pay and do the project. They have come back to us and said we want you to, basically, amend your engineering program because the westbound ramps now have wire supports and they want it to be redesigned to have mast arms just like the new one would. That is the way they do them nowadays, with mast arms and with back plates. To do that, we have the funds in our contingency funds, but when we passed 4742 the limit on the expenditure was 30,000 dollars. We need to increase that not to exceed 39,500 dollars and that will give us enough funds to do all the engineering for basically the second intersection. I would like to ask the Clerk to give this a temporary number.

Clerk of Council Smith: That will be T 111, Mayor.

B. Safety-Service Director:

Safety-Service Director Armbruster: Thank you, Mr. President. Last week I had the honor of presenting a proclamation to Captain Tom Shultz of the Fire Department who has retired and in fact, as he finished his shift that day, they actually took him home in Fire Engine 21 as is normal for a Fireman that is retiring and as I was reading the proclamation from Mayor Gillock, I realized that as he became a Captain in 1989, I was Mayor and I just happened to be here at the time and it was kind of a pleasure to actually bring him in as the Captain of the Fire Department. He is the longest standing Captain in the city of North Ridgeville's Fire Department and then actually reading the proclamation from Mayor Gillock for his retirement. It is kind of interesting to see that how your life changes between 89 and 2010.

We also had a Department Head Meeting preliminary to this coming Thursday. We have Department Head Meetings on a monthly basis and working with the Department Heads, as we all know that our budget is tight, and asking them to go beyond themselves to see how we can actually save money and come up with some innovative ideas as to how we can look at things a little bit differently here in City Hall to try to reduce our expenses and now, today, we went back

out and asked that if they choose not to speak, they can actually send us an email. One of the innovative things that came in today, which is really kind of unique and you think to yourself, you know is it really going to save money, but that actually is to turn the printer off, the printers that are on in the City, which you don't even think of doing or just making sure that your monitor or computer is in the off position. Those are more and more issues that you know; if you turn them all off as we are going through this process and to engage all of us in that process and I really would appreciate it if you all see some things that we need to be doing. It might be something that we are looking at, but we just overlook. We just don't make those decisions or we just don't see them. So, I would appreciate it if you would give us some feedback too, as we look to save as much money as possible in running this business of government. Thank you. That concludes my report.

President Corcoran: Thank you, Mr. Armbruster. You could probably reduce the wattage above the Mayor's head.

Safety-Service Director Armbruster: I actually put too many light bulbs up here, right?

Council Member Jaenke: I recommended a replacement for the Drainage and Flood Committee. Jim Kobie is at the point where he cannot attend meetings on a quarterly basis so, I contacted a resident; his name is Ernest Breda. He is a retiree from PPG Paints and he is the type of individual that I think will be an asset to the Committee and he does want to get involved in some of the activities. So, he will be at the next meeting and I will join him to introduce him to the group.

Mayor Gillock: Mr. President, as Council will recall, we received a grant for 175,000 dollars or renovations and improvements at the Olde Towne Hall. A lot of that has been done and in fact, everything that we have budgeted for so far, with the exception of the chair lift which will be done after the first of the year; which has been funded. They have to get their UL listings, so we are waiting on that. Everything else is done, except we have some punch list items that if we have enough money we could do. We have 4,306 dollars and 25 cents left in the grant. So, if we increase this 150 to that amount, then we will be able to exhaust that 175,000 dollars. We have one more 4,000 dollar project and I don't remember exactly what it is.

Safety-Service Director Armbruster: There are some sinks and some plumbing work that we need to do over there and some work on the front steps to finish those off. Just little tidbits of things but we knew we had enough money, but we just didn't have it in the right side of the equation and that is why we needed to move this 4,306 dollars and 25 cents over to the right side of the equation.

Mayor Gillock: This lets us use that entire 175,000 dollars and we would like to get this passed this evening so we can finish that project up.

Council Member Olesen: Mr. President, may I add something here? The people who run the Olde Towne Theater are ecstatic over what has been done there and now they can get air conditioning and our high school kids will be able to utilize that theater during the summer. They are thrilled by this. This is working out so well for everybody concerned.

President Corcoran: Any other comments?

Council Member Boose: Can I ask what the other 20,000 went to? If this exhausts the 175, then what did the other 20,000 go to?

Mayor Gillock: Twenty thousand of it went to Finkbeiner for engineering. Out of the 175,000, we spent 150,000, so far, on improvements as well as an original 7,000 that we spent to Finkbeiner to help us make the original application.

Council Member Boose: Thanks.

President Corcoran: It was moved by Gillock, seconded by Olesen to give T 109 a first reading this evening. All those in favor say yes. Those opposed say no.

President Corcoran: You have before you a resolution and I'll ask the Clerk to assign a T number to it.

Clerk of Council Smith: That will be T 112.

President Corcoran: This resolution is requesting and strongly urging that PUCO hold a public hearing in the city of North Ridgeville or an adjoining community relating to rate schedules for all-electric homes. If you remember, we have dealt with this issue in the past. We actually

passed a resolution back in March asking the PUCO to reinstate all-electric discounts for homeowners. Proceedings have continued to the point where they are looking to have public hearings and because the public hearings were so well attended, that occurred in North Ridgeville, we are asking to have one of those public hearings held here in North Ridgeville.

moved by Corcoran, seconded by Boose to suspend the By-Laws and give T 112 its first reading this evening.

President Corcoran: Are there any comments or questions?

Council Member Olesen: Mr. President, I think it is a great idea. I have had many, many calls from all-electric customers about what is going on and asking if they should take the NOPEC contract or should they keep what they have with the discount that they have enjoyed. It is really confusing at times. They are very confused about this whole issue. I think it is a great idea.

Mayor Gillock: Mr. President. First, my personal opinion is that if anyone is wondering about NOPEC, stay with NOPEC. That is my personal opinion. They are not always the lowest, but I think they are consistently near the bottom and the all-electric homes will still get their discounts. As President Corcoran has stated, the PUCO has now ordered these public hearings to be held. They have scheduled a number of hearings and one is not scheduled in this area. I have already written a letter to the PUCO asking that a hearing be held in North Ridgeville or a community nearby and I certainly support this resolution being adopted this evening with the emergency so we can get this down to the PUCO as soon as we can. This issue is critical to many of our residents, especially in Ridgefield. So, I think that especially after North Ridgeville was so involved in it the first time around, they are deserving of a public hearing be made available to them this time around. Thank you for introducing this.

Council Member Olesen: Mr. President, can I ask the Mayor a question, please?

President Corcoran: Go ahead.

Council Member Olesen: You recommended NOPEC Mr. Mayor but, I have been told to go with the contract that you have with Ohio Edison and that is what I have been telling people because, you already have a contract with them and you didn't know what NOPEC had to offer.

Mayor Gillock: If you do nothing, you remain with NOPEC with Ohio Edison. To do something different, you have to opt out and First Energy offers another plan. It is confusing. You can stay with NOPEC or you can opt out. Either way, you are going to be with First Energy. I have just found it easier in the long run to stay with NOPEC. We get the discounts. They are consistently very competitive. I don't remember exactly what the rates are, but the only thing I will point out is that by being a member of NOPEC, we do get a grant of powering our community. We get 30.00 dollars per household that belongs to NOPEC. Right now, we have a grant in hand for 196,000 dollars. So, there are additional benefits in belonging to NOPEC.

Council Member Olesen: If I might again, there was a postcard that came out like, two months ago, with that said you could opt in or opt out of what you have.

Mayor Gillock: No, you can only opt out.

Council Member Olesen: Okay, this is what caused all the questions. So, most people have not taken NOPEC because they were fearful that, that contract would not be as good as what they now have.

President Corcoran: Let me just summarize real quick. It is a personal choice. There is a discount available if you join NOPEC. It is approximately one to two percent of your bill. The opposite side of the argument is that if you join NOPEC, you're locking yourself into a contract with First Energy and you are limiting the ability for competitors to come into the market because you are locked into the contract with NOPEC. So, there is good and bad with either choice.

Mayor Gillock: The times of the contracts don't coincide. They are different lengths. They are different times.

President Corcoran: If you are not a member of NOPEC, you can switch at any time. If you are a member of NOPEC, then you can't.

Mayor Gillock: Not to drag it out, but they send those cards out every two years and if you don't opt out every two years, you will end up back in NOPEC.

President Corcoran: It was moved by Corcoran and seconded by Boose to give T 112 a first reading this evening. All those in favor say yes. Those opposed say no.
